We didn't want to holdup, at the request of several of the Firefighter Trustees, the Retro payments to those who we could in good conscience pay.

So what you would do today, if you agree to this, is you would be agreeing to the Retro payments detailed in the addendums and the ones that are footnoted will be reserved pending future information from the City of Chicago. So, we will be back to you on those footnoted cases once we have the information needed.

To make it easy for the Trustees, we have included in your Board portals, in the confidential portion of your materials, a list of all of the individuals for whom we are not yet able to process the retro benefits. So that you can see those names in case they ask you questions, you know who they are, and you can assure them that we are working diligently to address the issue with the

City. Sarah is working diligently with staff and with the City, and the good graces of the various Trustees who are helping us to try to see if we can get the City to resolve this issue and/or Local 2 resolve the issue.

With that explanation, that should allow you to approve these Retro payments to the individuals listed on Addendums $I$ through XII.

a hearing on the application of Mr. Michael Cummings for a Duty Disability benefit coming on today.

Good morning, sir. I am one of the attorneys for the Pension Fund. I will be conducting this hearing for the record. I'd like to advise you of some preliminary matters before we start the evidence.

First of all, there are currently seven trustees available to hear the evidence on your application. If you don't know you should know you need the affirmative or yes vote of at least five of those seven trustees in order to receive this benefit, do you understand that?

MR. CUMMINGS: Yes, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Then the record also
indicates that you do not have an attorney who is going to be representing you in this matter. In other words, you will be representing yourself. Is it your desire to proceed without an attorney?

MR. CUMMINGS: Yes, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Finally, it is the applicant's burden of proof to present sufficient evidence to the Board in order for the Board to
grant the benefit that the applicant is seeking. Do you understand it is your burden of proof?

MR. CUMMINGS: Yes, sir.
MR. PINELLI: By way of procedures, I am going to start by asking you some questions under oath. The Board members may or may not have questions of you. Then $I$ will call the Fund doctor to testify. If there is anything I don't ask him that you think is important for the Board to know, please let me know and then you will be given that opportunity. Do you understand the procedures?

MICHAEL J. CUMMINGS
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

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BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Mr. Cummings, please state your name for
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A Michael James Cummings.
Q What is your rank with the Fire
Department?
A Lieutenant EMT.
Q What was your last assignment before you went on layup?

A Engine 49.
Q Directing your attention to the Board
Exhibits, which have previously been marked 1 through 12, you should have been provided a copy of those by the staff. Did you receive them?

A Yes.
Q Did you have the opportunity to review them?

A Yes, sir.
Q Do you have any objection to their admission into this record in support of your application?

A No, I don't.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
Mr. Chairman, I would move for admission
of Board Exhibits 1 through 12, without objection from the applicant.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Now, Mr. Cummings, directing your attention to the date of March 21st of 2020, is that the date on which you were injured that is the basis of your application for these disability benefits?

A Yes, sir.
Q Now understanding the Board has your sworn statement as part of the exhibits, could you still just briefly describe for them where you were and what happened to you on that day that caused you the injury?

A Okay. So we started at work on the \(20 t h\), so the 21st \(I\) got injured. It was just after midnight.

Q Okay. Where were you and why were you there?

A I was still on my platoon date so seven o'clock the next morning.

Q Okay. Where were you when you were injured and why were you at that location?

A So we were stilled out for a still on 3742 South Ashland and when we arrived we were told that there were occupants in the building still.

So we let out a hose line into the building. At the same time they were doing a primary search. We found nothing. There was a heavy fire load and we didn't find anybody.

When we were exiting the building, I had my light on two guys, watched them go out the door, and then it was like hell raised on top of me.

I was struck in the head with a beam.
Knocked my helmet off, my face piece off, and at the same time it pinned my left hand on a shelf -the top of a refrigerator.

And I looked over and there was Dan Malone was coming up from getting out of the debris. We called for a May Day. Some guys came back in from my company and they were able to lift the beam off after a couple of minutes to remove my hand.
Q It was your left hand; is that correct?
A Yes, sir, my left hand was pinned in.
Q Did you ever have an injury to your left hand prior to that incident?

A Probably, I think I got it caught in the door, maybe 15 years ago. I just basically went to the hospital because it was on-duty. I was never laid up for that.

Q Very well. Now after this injury, then, obviously, you were taken to the hospital and you underwent -- subsequently you underwent medical treatment for your left hand. The records indicate you had a surgery, the first surgery, on March 24 th of 2020; is that correct?

A Yes, sir. I was taken to Stroger ICU for blunt trauma. They were worried about smoke inhalation because my face was sooted up but it was just my mask was just knocked off temporarily and it was put back on.

And I was taken to Stroger. I woke up in the back of the ambulance. I didn't think I had any fingers left. After a little bit of reassurance, they said they are there. They don't look good but they are there.

I went to Stroger. They treated me for the trauma. CT scan for my head. They kept an eye on my vital signs and then general stuff. It was off to the first surgery.

Q After that surgery, you underwent a period of physical therapy to rehabilitate your left hand and finger?

A Yes.
Q And then it looks like from the records you underwent a Work Capacity Evaluation in August of last year but you weren't able to pass it sufficiently because of the condition of your left hand and middle finger, correct?

A Correct.
Q Then you subsequently underwent a second surgery on that same hand; is that correct?

A Yes, I did.
Q And that from the records it looks like that took place on January 15 th of this year, correct?

A Yes. In between the first surgery and that, \(I\) probably did 15 plus physical therapy to try to get my hand working without the surgery at Sports and Ortho 10909 South Western three days a
week.
Q When that didn't work or didn't get it back functioning properly, then you had the second surgery, correct?

A Yeah. Before they did the surgery, they did an EMG test to test the nerves.

Q Okay. Following the second surgery now, sir, have you been undergoing physical therapy again?

A Yes, sir.
Q And can you describe for the Board at this time the condition and functioning of your left hand and fingers?

A I am unable to make a fist or grab something, you know, tight with my left hand. And I am missing the feeling and the finger kind of flops around a little bit.

Q Okay. But you're still undergoing treatment to try to continue your rehabilitation, correct?

A Yes, sir. Yes, sir.
Q Now since you went on layup, have you engaged in any activities by which you earn income?

A No, sir. scheduled with your doctor that is treating you for the left hand?

A Yes. In fact, \(I\) was in physical therapy this week and \(I\) am back there next week and the week after that.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you, very much, Mr. Cummings.

I have no further questions of this witness.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any questions?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
MR. PINELLI: Hearing no questions, I would ask Dr. Samo to testify.
(Witness previously sworn.) DANIEL SAMO, M.D.
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION
BY MR. PINELLI:

Q Sir, please state your name.
A Daniel Samo.

Q You are a physician; is that correct?
A Yes.

Q And a copy of your qualifications as a physician are attached to the Board Exhibits; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q And do you perform a function as a consultant to this fund?

A Yes.

Q And in addition to yourself, does also Dr. Michael Peters perform that function for this fund?

A Yes.

Q Now, with respect to this applicant, did you review certain medical records?

A I did.

Q Did you have the opportunity to interview him as well?

A Yes, I did a telephone interview with him.

Q Doctor, you conducted an interview due to the current restrictions because of the COVID-19,
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correct?

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A That is correct.

Q And with respect to your interview of him, was the information he provided to you consistent with the medical records you had reviewed?

A Yes.

Q Can you briefly summarize for the Board what you found with respect to his records and your interview of him and his condition?

A So as he described the mechanism of the injury, crush injury to his hand. He was seen at Stroger. They cleaned it up and sutured it.

Then when he followed up with the orthopedist, the orthopedist opened the wound in his office to explore the wound. He did not find any lacerations of tendons or of the nerve bundle. He talked about how he had lost range of motion and sensation, which was consistent with what was in the records as well as his ongoing therapy.

The second surgery he had was for carpal tunnel release, which probably was not really related to the injury. It didn't really solve his problems.

Q Doctor, given what he has indicated about his current condition, would that condition inhibit or prevent him from performing his assigned duties?

A Yes. He really has difficulty gripping due to loss of range of motion in his index finger. He has some clumsiness with fine motor skills because of the ongoing nerve problems as well as difficulty grasping heavy things. He finds he drops heavy things so that would interfere with his ability to perform many of his essential job tasks.

Q Since the surgery was in January is there any indication that he's reached MMI yet or is he still on his way there?

A No, I think he still has potential to improve, which is why he's still in therapy. Certainly the range of motion and the motor strength may improve but that's not known yet at this point.

Q Given that, doctor, would you recommend to the Fund that you put him in case management to continue to monitor his rehabilitation?

A Yes.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you, doctor. That is all the questions I have.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any questions for Dr. Samo?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
Mr. President, I make a motion to grant.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Seconded by Trustee
Holt.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: There is a motion to
grant by Trustee McPhillips. Second by Trustee Holt.

MR. CUMMINGS: Thank you.

MR. PINELII: Let the record reflect this is a hearing on the application of Mr. Michael Imburgia for an Occupational Disease Disability benefit.

Good morning, Mr. Imburgia. I am one of the attorneys for the Pension Fund. I will be conducting this hearing for the record. I'd like to advise you of some preliminary matters before we start evidence.

First of all, there are eight trustees on the line and present to hear the evidence on your application. If you don't know you should know you need the yes vote of at least five of those eight trustees per the Pension Code in order for you to
receive this benefit, do you understand that?
MR. IMBURGIA: I do, sir.
MR. PINELLI: The record also indicates that you are not having an attorney representing you in this matter. Do you wish to proceed without an attorney today?

MR. IMBURGIA: Yes, please.
MR. PINELLI: Lastly, it is the applicant's burden of proof to present sufficient evidence to the Board in order for the Board to grant the benefit that the applicant is seeking. Do you understand it is your burden of proof?

MR. IMBURGIA: Yes, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Okay. By way of procedures, \(I\) am going to ask you some questions under oath, along with the Fund's doctor/physician consultant. If there is anything \(I\) don't ask the doctor that you think is important for the Board to know, please let me know and you will be given that opportunity. Do you understand the procedures for today's hearing?

MR. IMBURGIA: Yes, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Okay, then we are ready to proceed. Mr. Imburgia, could you please raise your
right hand? And, Dr. Samo, if you would do the same.
(Witnesses sworn.)

MICHAEL E. IMBURGIA
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION

BY MR. PINELLI:

Q Mr. Imburgia, could you please state your name and just spell your last name for the record?

A Michael I Imburgia, \(I-m-b-u-r-a-i-a\).

Q Sir, what is your current rank with the Fire Department?

A Battalion Chief.

Q What was your last assignment before you went on layup?

A Battalion 13.

Q You should have been provided a copy of what's been marked as Board Exhibits 1 through 11 prior to today's hearing. Did you get a copy of those exhibits from the staff?

A \(\quad\) I did, sir.
Q Did you have an opportunity to review them?

A I did. There is a couple of things that were omitted maybe because it happened after the fact.

Q Okay. When you say omitted --
A Would we go through like chronological order of what transpired with my health?

Q The Board has the benefit of all these medical records, that are marked as Board Exhibits already so we won't go into great detail on that. However, if there is something that's not in there that you think the Board should know about, \(I\) will give you that opportunity to explain that to them.

A Okay. Now, sir?
Q No, when I get to my questions. I just want to know, first of all, whether you have any objection to the introduction of these Board Exhibits that have been marked into the record in support of your application?

A No objection.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
Mr. President, I move for admission of
Board Exhibits 1 through 11, without objection from the applicant.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Admitted without
objection.
(Board Exhibits 1 through 11
were admitted into evidence.)
MR. PINELLI: Thank you, Mr. President. BY MR. PINELLI:

Q Now, Mr. Imburgia, you are applying for this Occupational Disease Disability benefit based upon a medical condition that you have related to your heart; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q The records do indicate that you entered service in 1988; is that correct?

A Yes, sir.
Q And did you have any issues with your heart prior to entering service with the Fire Department?

A No, I did not. As a matter of fact, I was examined for that. They did a 12-lead EKG and they gave us a thorough exam. Nothing was detected at that time.

Q So you developed the conditions related to your heart that are the basis of your application after you have been in service with the Fire Department; is that correct?

A As far as \(I\) know. I was on the busiest truck in the City on the west side Tower Ladder 14. I don't know if that took a toll on me or not. I was unaware of it and \(I\) surmise that this probably -- it could have attributed to it, sir.

Q Let me ask you since you brought it up, that is a good point, can you just give the Board a brief chronology of the assignments you have had in your career to-date from when you came on to your most recent assignment?

A Yes, sir. When \(I\) came on, \(I\) went to the west side Tower Ladder 14 as I stated. I was there for 12 years. I made Lieutenant and \(I\) was assigned as a Reliever out at O'Hare Airport. It wasn't my intention to stay there but \(I\) found it pretty fascinating and I relieved for about 20 years. I was going back in and out of the City. You know, there were only three houses at the time so if they didn't need a Reliever then \(I\) would go all over the City. I was kind of citywide, to be honest with you. I did that for 20 years. I made Captain. They said \(I\) had to have an assignment so \(I\) put in for Engine 10, which is also at the airport. Made Captain. Out of Engine 10 I made Battalion Chief
and \(I\) went back to Battalion 13.

Q Very well, thank you for that. With respect to your treatment and so forth, as \(I\) said earlier, the Board has the benefit of all the medical records so we are not going to go through that in detail. But \(I\) did want to indicate, you did have an open heart surgery procedure on February 24 th of 2020 ; is that correct?

A Yes, sir.

Q And are you still taking any medications related to that treatment for your heart?

A I am, sir. Probably around eight different medications.

Q Okay. Now, since you went on layup have you engaged in any activities by which you earn income?

A I do own a plumbing company but \(I\) don't participate in it. I just continue it because I feel the responsibility to keep my employees working. They have families and bills. But \(I\) haven't worked in over ten years.

Q You don't perform any physical labor or any physical labor as --

A No, not in the last ten years. I take
care of all of the office work. My wife used to do it but she passed away so I pretty much take it all on myself.

Q Then before I go to the doctor, can you tell us, you said that there was some things not in the record that you just wanted the Board to be aware of with respect to your heart. Can you tell us what that is?

A Right. I will try to be brief. I started getting symptomatic. I started retaining water and then \(I\) was having trouble breathing. I had water in my lungs. I went to the hospital. They said I needed a valve replacement, but also they discovered that \(I\) had an aneurysm in my aorta and that \(I\) was in afib so they did a procedure. While they were doing the procedure, they also corrected the aneurysm while they were in. I think that is information you already have.

After that they did a TEE,
Transesophageal Echo, because \(I\) went back into afib. They discovered a blood clot in my right atrium so they weren't able to do an ablation on me which would try to correct that defect.

They couldn't do it then so they
continued me on the Warfarin to thin the blood and try to clear the aneurysm away, which could cause a stroke or death, so it concerned me very much.

They waited around a month. They did another Transesophageal Echo and the blood clot had cleared so they did the ablation on me. It was probably the last procedures that \(I\) have done; the most recent.

Q When was the ablation?
A I don't have the dates but maybe within a month.

Q Okay. So right now was it successful in getting your atrial fibrillation under control?

A I did go in for a 12-lead echo and they said right now it is okay. It could reoccur. As of now, yes, sir.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you for that additional information, that is helpful to the Board.

I have no further questions of the applicant.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any questions?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: No questions.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you. Then \(I\) will
call Dr. Samo to testify.
(Witness previously sworn.)
DANIEL SAMO, M.D.
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

\section*{EXAMINATION}

BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Sir, please state your name.
A Daniel Samo.
Q And you're a physician; is that correct?
A Yes.
Q And you perform a function as a consultant to this fund?

A Yes.
Q Does Dr. Michael Peters also perform this same function for the Fund?

A Yes.
Q Do both of you in that capacity review medical records, interview or examine applicants and report to the Board?

A Yes.
Q In this particular case, did Dr. Peters
perform the interview of the applicant?
A Yes, he did the record review and the interview.

Q In preparation for today's hearing, have you reviewed Dr. Peters' report?

A Yes.
Q Incidentally, that report is marked as Board Exhibit Number 2, correct?

A Yes.

Q In addition to reviewing Dr. Peters' report, have you also reviewed all of the Board Exhibits that have been introduced into the record?

A Yes.

Q Now, with respect to this applicant, can you just summarize for the Board what his condition is with respect to his heart?

A Yes. So it all began, he has a congenital bicuspid aortic valve. In other words, it has two leaflets instead of three. And he also had two episodes of bacterial endocarditis, which will further damage the valve and probably is the cause of his aneurysm.

The symptoms he describes, because he was in very bad heart failure with a very bad cardiac
output, his surgeries corrected much of this.
Although, he still is having cardiac heart failure. His output is still poor and because of his atrial fibrillation he is anticoagulated still at this time until such time they know for sure that he's not going back into atrial fibrillation and he's able to get off some of the medication that he is on.

Q Okay. Did you also review a record from his treating cardiologist, Dr. Flaherty, indicating that he can't perform any demanding physical labor, including going to fire scenes?

A Correct.
Q Would you agree with both that assessment as well as Dr. Peters' report?

A Yes. I mean, his cardiac output is very poor and he would not be able to exert himself. He's also on an anticoagulant which in and of itself would not allow him to return to full duty.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you, doctor. I have no further questions.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any
questions for the doctor?
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, having

MR. PINELLI: The record also indicates that you did not retain an attorney to represent you in this matter. Is it your desire to proceed without an attorney?

MR. KURBAN: That is correct, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Lastly, it is the applicant's burden of proof to present sufficient evidence to the Board in order for the Board to grant the benefit that the applicant is seeking. Do you understand it is your burden of proof?

MR. KURBAN: Yes, I do.
MR. PINELLI: By way of procedures, I am going to start by asking you some questions under oath. The board members may or may not have questions of you. Then \(I\) will call the Fund's physician consultant to testify. If there is anything \(I\) don't ask him that you think is important for the Board to know, let me know and you will be given that opportunity. Do you understand the procedures?

MR. KURBAN: Yes, I do, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you. Then I would ask that you raise your right hand, along with Dr. Samo.
(Witnesses sworn.)
SAM A. KURBAN
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION
BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Mr. Kurban, could you please state your your name and spell your last name for the record?

A My name is Sam Anthony Kurban. Last name \(K-u-r-b-a-n\).

Q What is your rank with the Fire Department?

A Firefighter EMT.
Q What was your last assignment before you went on layup for this injury?

A Truck 9.
Q Directing your attention to the group of Board Exhibits 1 through 12, you should have been provided a copy of those by the staff before today's hearing. Did you receive them?

A Yes, I did.
Q Did you have an opportunity to review them?

A Yes, I did.
\(Q\) Do you have any objection to their admission into the record in support of your application?

A Absolutely not.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
Mr. President, \(I\) would move for admission of Board Exhibits 1 through 12, without objection.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Admitted without objection.
(Board Exhibits 1 through 12
were admitted into evidence.)
MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Now, Mr. Kurban, directing your attention to March 28 th of 2020 is that the day on which you incurred an injury that is the basis of your application?

A That is correct.
Q Now understanding that the Board has the benefit of your sworn statement to them about what happened, could you still briefly describe for us where you were and what happened to you that caused you the injury that is the basis of your application?

A Okay. On March 28th of 2020, at approximately 20 hours into my shift, at about two-thirty in the morning, my firehouse received a phone call for an accident on the Kennedy Expressway. So my truck, our engine, and our ambulance all responded to it.

When we arrived on the scene, there was a woman standing at the roadside who was the driver of an overturned vehicle that was upside down in a ditch right off of the Kennedy Expressway.

She had minor injuries and she said her boyfriend was still trapped in the vehicle. Myself and another member, we grabbed our e-Tools, which are more commonly known as the Jaws of Life to most people.

We removed the two driver side doors, even though this gentleman was a passenger, because the car was on its roof and it was leaning on the passenger side so we couldn't gain access to the passenger side.

We removed the two driver side doors. I crawled into the back of the vehicle. A partner off the engine crawled into the front.

The occupant was lifeless and
unresponsive. He was wrapped up in the seated belt suspended over our head. His head was stuck between the two front seats. We tried to remove his head from the two front seats but because of the position of his torso we couldn't remove his head. So we needed to cut the seatbelt but prior to cutting the seatbelt, \(I\) extended my arm straight up. Like \(I\) pulled my arm in a 90 degrees and my elbow on the ground and my palm facing up in the air. And \(I\) placed my palm under the man's torso to hold his body weight up while we cut the seatbelt because if we let his torso down he might have suffered more injuries to his head, neck or spine.

Once my partner cut the seatbelt, \(I\) now had the victim's body weight in the palm of my hand, which was fine at this time, and with my other hand and with the assistance of my partner, we removed his head from between the two front seats.

As we removed his head, he regained consciousness and he became combative and he began fighting with me in the back compartment. Through the tussle my shoulder -- my upper arm dislocated from my shoulder joint and \(I\)-- at this point \(I\)
have his whole body on my side of the vehicle and he is still fighting with me.

And I kept identifying myself as a firefighter. Told him he was in an accident. I needed him to remain calm so \(I\) can remove him from the vehicle. He acknowledged. He stopped fighting and he was moaning and crying in pain.

At that point \(I\) just yelled behind me that I had the occupant freed and he would be coming out head first and I needed a backboard slid underneath me.

Once I had the backboard underneath me, I attempted to back myself out and pull this gentleman but I couldn't do both because of the condition of my arm.

So I made a quick body harness out of some rope in my pocket. I backed out. I pulled the victim onto the stretcher -- I'm sorry, onto the backboard.

Once on the backboard, myself and probably every other member on scene, we all grabbed a piece of the backboard, we walked up the embankment, placed him on the stretcher and I ceased all patient care at that time.
\(Q\) Now you mentioned injuring your shoulder. Which shoulder was it that you injured?

A It was my left shoulder, sir.
Q Prior to this incident, had you ever had an injury or any problems with your left shoulder?

A The year previous to that we were lifting a 400 -pound patient, which we had on a daily basis at my fire house. I had a shoulder injury then. It was resolved within that year.

I might add four other members were also injured as a result of the lifting of this particular patient so.

Q That injury resolved without any surgical intervention, correct?

A That is correct, sir, yes.
Q The physical therapy and conservative treatment, correct?

A Correct.

Q Now following this injury, you underwent a MRI, which indicated there was damage in your left shoulder, and that resulted you in having an initial surgery on May 29th of 2020; is that correct?

A That is correct, sir.

Q Following that initial surgery, the records indicate that you underwent some physical therapy following that surgery; is that correct?

A I went through 74 sessions of physical therapy in the entire time which was nine months. I never had full range of motion. I had pain off the charts. I was given a steroid pack for the medication to help relieve those symptoms which did not help. I also received a cortisone shot and after nine months of therapy \(I\) still did not have full range of motion. I could only lift my arm 90 degrees in an abducted position.

At that time \(I\) even requested Medical if I could change therapy providers which I did. I went to a different facility because it just wasn't working at my initial one.

Obviously, at that point -- not obviously, but at that point it wasn't get better at all. I talked extensively with Medical about getting a second opinion because nothing was working.

Medical was ever so gracious about acquiring another doctor for me and \(I\) did have a second surgery.
\(\square\)
Q That was performed on February 25 th of this year, correct?

A Yes, that is correct, sir.
Q Following that second surgery now have you started up physical therapy yet?

A I started physical therapy six days after my surgery so I have been going to physical therapy for over a month now.

After the surgery \(I\) had better range of motion by far than after my first surgery and \(I\) was very, very, very optimistic.

I was telling everybody. I went to the firehouse. I told the guys I will be back soon, guys. I told Medical that this has been a game changer for me. I am so pumped about this.

And then as of right now, which \(I\) am at the two month mark, \(I\) still can't do anything that I did. I am actually right back to where \(I\) was before. I can't even put my wallet in my back pocket right now. I don't have full range of motion. My pain is excalating and it's just really no better, except for my range of motion.

Q Since you went on layup, have you engaged in any activity by which you earn income?

A No, sir.
Q Have you engaged in any sporting activities?

A None whatsoever.

Q Do you have any appointments scheduled with the doctor that performed -- is that Dr. Garrigues?

A Yes, Dr. Garrigues. I have an appointment on May \(18 t h\).

MR. PINELLI: Thank you, that is all the questions \(I\) have at this time.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any questions?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: No questions, Vince.
MR. PINELLI: All right. Thank you. At this time \(I\) would call Dr. Samos.
(Witness previously sworn.) DANIEL SAMO, MAD.
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION
BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Please, state your name.

A Daniel Samo.
Q You are a physician; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q And you perform a function as a
consultant to this fund?
A Yes.
Q In that capacity, do you review medical records, interview or examine applicants and write a report to the Board?

A Yes.
Q And in addition to yourself, does Dr. Michael Peters also perform this same function?

A Yes.
Q With respect to this applicant, which one of you did the interview of Mr. Kurban?

A Dr. Peters did the record review and the interview.

Q Did he file a written report with the Board that is marked as Board Exhibit 2 ?

A Yes.

Q Now, doctor, prior to today's hearing, did you review both his report as well as all of the Board Exhibits that were introduced into evidence?

A Yes.
Q Can you briefly summarize for the Board the current status of his left shoulder?

A His current status is that he's just recently postoperative for his second procedure and as he said he's still symptomatic. He is still having pain which would be expected at this time.

Q Is there some general time frame within which you would expect under normal circumstances that he would reach MMI following the second surgery?

A The shoulder surgery, it is usually prolonged, three to six months at least.

Q So what he's experiencing right now is not anything out of the ordinary for his condition and having undergone a second surgery so recently?

A I am not surprised that he's not at MMI yet. His symptoms are getting worse. Hopefully that reverses itself but at this point you can't really tell.

Q Okay. Based on that then, would you agree with Dr. Peters that he's not capable of performing his duties at this time?

A Yes, I would absolutely agree with that.
\(Q\) Would you have a recommendation of the Board for case management given the recentness of his surgery?

A Yes, I think he should be seen probably at three months postoperatively and six months postoperatively to see if he indeed improves.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you, doctor, I have no further questions.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any
questions for the doctor?
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
Motion to grant.
MEMBER MURPHY: Second.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: There is a motion to grant by Trustee McPhillips. Seconded by Trustee Murphy.

Trustee Murphy.
MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Holt.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Conyears-Ervin.

MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.

MEMBER SONI: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips.
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens.
MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And \(I\) am a yes.
Motion carries.
MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, I'd like to make a motion for reexam consistent with the Board's policies.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Motion for reexam by
Trustee Murphy. Seconded by Trustee McPhillips.
Trustee Murphy.
MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Holt.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee
Conyears-Ervin.
MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.
MEMBER SONI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips. MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes. CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens. MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.
MEMBER VALENCIA: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And I am a yes.
Motion carries.
MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, counsel
has previously sent around the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law. I make a motion to adopt the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law in this matter.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Motion by Trustee
Murphy. Seconded by Trustee McPhillips.
Trustee Murphy.
MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Holt.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Conyears-Ervin.

MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.

MEMBER SONI: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips.
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens.
MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.
MEMBER VALENCIA: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And I am a yes.
Motion carries.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Sir, based on the Findings of Fact made by the Trustees, the Trustees have voted to grant the benefit that you have requested.

You will be notified by mail of the Findings of Fact and the Board's decision.

MR. KURBAN: Thank you, very much, all of you board members. Much appreciated.

MS. BURNS: Mr. President, now would you entertain a motion to go into closed session pursuant to Section \(2(c) 4\) of the Open Meetings Act to discuss the next hearing?

MEMBER MURPHY: I'd like to make that motion.

MEMBER VALENCIA: Second.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Motion by Trustee
Murphy. Seconded by Trustee Valencia.
Trustee Murphy.
MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Holt.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee
Conyears-Ervin.
MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.
MEMBER SONI: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips.
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens.
MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.
MEMBER VALENCIA: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And \(I\) am a yes.
Motion carries.
MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, I'd like to ask Vince to present Elizabeth Mazor, Paramedic in Charge.

MR. PINELLI: Okay. Thank you, Mr.

Secretary. Is Ms. Mazor on the line?
MR. MARCONI: Vince, she is here. I had her come to my office so we didn't have technology issues. We are on the same Zoom call.

MR. PINELLI: Very well. Okay. Let the record reflect this is a hearing on the application for a Duty Disability benefit being made by Elizabeth Mazor, who is present.

Good morning, Ms. Mazor. Can you hear me?

MS. MAZOR: I am sorry?
MR. MARCONI: I am turning up my volume.
MR. PINELLI: I just introduced myself.
I am one of the attorneys for the Pension Fund. Good morning.

MS. MAZOR: Good morning, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Let the record reflect Ms. Mazor is present by both audio and video, along with her counsel.

Counsel, could you please identify yourself for the record?

MR. MARCONI: Jerry Marconi on behalf of the applicant.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you. Now we are
ready to proceed with the hearing.
I'd like to take care of some preliminary items before we start evidence as we always do as you know.

First of all, counsel, you should have received the Board Exhibits or at least had the opportunity to receive them and review them before today's date.

MR. MARCONI: Yes, I believe I received two different deliveries. One fairly recent with some updated records and then I think there was another one maybe a year or two ago.

MR. PINELLI: Yes, \(I\) think in total they are marked Board Exhibits 1 through 20.

MR. MARCONI: Right.
MR. PINELLI: Okay. Do you have any objection to their admission into the record?

MR. MARCONI: I do not.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you. Then you have also submitted for the Board's consideration what's been marked as Applicant's Exhibit 1; is that correct?

MR. MARCONI: That is correct.
MR. PINELLI: Could you just briefly
describe what it is? You don't have to talk about it, but just what is it?

MR. MARCONI: All it is, it is a summary order from the Illinois Appellate Court, which affirmed the conviction of the individual who assaulted Ms. Mazor. And it has some facts in it so \(I\) was just going to rely on those facts as opposed to going through the whole incident again, unless the Board wants us to go through that again.

MR. PINELLI: Okay. Let's just deal with the exhibit at this point.

At this point, Mr. President, I would move for admission of Board Exhibits 1 through 20, without objection from the applicant. The applicant is moving for admission of Board Exhibit 1A, which he did tender to us. I reviewed it. I have no objection to it. It is a court order, a valid court order, so \(I\) have no objection to it. So we would ask that all those exhibits be entered into the evidence at this time.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: They are admitted without objection.
(Board Exhibits 1 through 10 and Applicant Exhibit 1A were admitted
into evidence.)
MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
Now at this time then we are ready to proceed.

Counsel, how do you wish to proceed at this time, calling witnesses or --

MR. MARCONI: Yes. Vince, there is one thing that \(I\) guess we can put in the record. I know that the Board had subpoenaed her partner at the time and then \(I\) sent you an email and sent Lori an email saying \(I\) could call him first so that he doesn't have to sit through this.

I know that he has to be out of here by 11 anyway so what \(I\) was going to do was call Mr . Ortega first, put him on quickly. I am assuming you would cross examine him and then he would be done, he could be released.

MR. PINELLI: Yes, we appreciate that consideration for him as well so please feel free to call him as your first witness.

MR. MARCONI: I would call, hopefully he is on, Oscar Ortega.

MR. PINELLI: Mr. Ortega, can you hear us?

MR. ORTEGA: Yes. Can you hear me?
MR. PINELLI: Yes, we can. Thank you.
Before you testify, \(I\) want to advise you of a couple of things. First of all, \(I\) am one of the attorneys for the Board and we're conducting this hearing for the record.

And at this time I'd like you to raise your right hand.
(Witness sworn.)
MR. PINELLI: Thank you, sir. I am going to turn you over to Mr. Marconi, who is the attorney for Ms. Mazor.

You may proceed.
OSCAR ORTEGA
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION
BY MR. MARCONI:

Q Good morning, Mr. Ortega.
A Good morning.
Q Just for the record, can you state where you are currently employed?

A Yes, I am currently employed for the Chicago Fire Department.
\(Q\) How long have you been employed by the
Chicago Fire Department?

A I have been employed for the Chicago Fire Department since April 1, 2015.

Q Are you a Paramedic?
A I am.
Q The date of an incident here was January
11 of 2017. Were you a Paramedic on that date?
A Yes, I was.
Q You know Beth Mazor, correct?
A Correct, I do.

Q Was she your partner on that day?
A Yes, she was.
Q Was she your regular partner?
A No, she was not my regular partner.
Q I realize this was over four years ago.
I am assuming your memory is somewhat cloudy as to the details, correct?

A Correct. As far as details, I really don't remember much. But as far as the incidents, then, you know, yes.

Q I will lead you a little bit. At about 9:30 in the evening, do you remember responding to a single vehicle crash in your ambulance with Ms.

Mazor?
A Yes, I do.

Q It's my understanding you would have loaded this person into the ambulance to be taken to Northwestern Hospital; is that correct?

A Correct.
Q Who was driving?
A That would be me, sir.
Q As you got near Northwestern to the emergency room, did you hear a commotion in the back?

A I remember my partner Beth Mazor stating something along the lines that our patient was trying to get out of the spinal immobilization we had placed him in, which would be a C-collar and a backboard. And then \(I\) remember asking her if she needed me to pull over to help her out.

Q Okay. And it's my understanding you didn't pull over until you got into the bay of the emergency room; is that correct?

A Correct.
Q When you got out of the ambulance, do you remember if security guards were there one way or the other?

A Yes, they were.
Q Okay. Do you remember who opened the rear of the ambulance?

A I do not. I do not recall if it was me or if it was the security from Northwestern.

Q Okay. Were you at the rear of the ambulance when the doors were opened?

A I am not sure if \(I\) was at the rear or if I was on the side door.

Q Did you see anything unusual when the doors opened with regard to your patient and Ms. Mazor?

A Yes. As the doors, whether it were the rear ones or the side door, were opened, I recall seeing my partner in distress with the patient holding onto her hair.

Q Did you try to help her?
A Of course I did.

Q How did you try to help her?
A I immediately jumped to the captain's chair, which is located directly behind the head of the patient. If you can imagine the gurney inside the back of the ambulance, the captain's chair would be directly behind the head of the patient.

So I jumped on that chair and tried to pry the fingers of our patient off of my partner's hair.

Q What kind of effort did you have to use in order to get his hands off of her or out of her hair, whatever he was doing?

A It was a pretty strong effort. He was surprisingly pretty strong. I had to put some elbow grease in there, if you will.

Q Were the security guards helping you at this point trying to get him off of Ms. Mazor?

A I don't recall if they were helping me to pry the fingers off but \(I\) am sure they were inside like trying to hold him down in some sorts of fashion.

Q Okay. Eventually did you get -- either you or the security guards, did you get him off of her?

A I believe we did by the time we were to get him unloaded off of the ambulance.

Q Okay. Do you remember one way or the other whether Ms. Mazor then had some treatment in the ER?

A Yes. So I remember her -- what I remember is after we transferred care of our
patient to the trauma team, I do what I normally do. I go to the back of the ambulance and I cleanup whatever mess is left behind. And my partner walking up to me and saying that she wanted -- she needed to be seen because she was hurt. So I was like, well, if you are hurt, then, yes, of course, you know, get seen by all means. So, yes, she did get seen that day.

Q Did you work the rest of the day by yourself? In other words, she didn't join you working finishing off the shift, correct?

A Correct. She did not finish off the shift with us. She did -- she was seen at the hospital. I don't remember how many hours or so but I do remember -- I do remember getting a partner for the remainder of our shift. A different partner \(I\) should say.

Q And then, quickly, as far as testifying about what happened, today is not the first time you testified, correct?

A That is correct. I testified in the Cook County court's building. I believe it is the court's building. The one on 26 th Street. I want to say maybe two years ago, two, three years ago.

I don't remember exactly when it was. But, yes, it is not my first time.

Q It may have been like a year after the incident happened, correct?

A Possibly, correct.
Q You really have not had much contact, if any contact, with Ms. Mazor during that period of time, correct?

A Correct.

Q I mean, she is not a social friend of yours? You guys don't meet? I mean, you don't hang around the same social circles, correct?

A No. Correct. We haven't had any contact I believe since we worked together possibly.

Q And maybe at the criminal trial did you see her?

A I don't -- No, I didn't see her then.
MR. MARCONI: All right. I have nothing else, Vince.

\section*{EXAMINATION}

BY MR. PINELLI:
Q Stay on the line, please, sir, \(I\) just have a couple of quick questions for you as well. This is again Vince Pinelli attorney for the

Pension Fund. Can you hear me?
A Yes, \(I\) can hear you.
Q You mentioned that you were working with her this day. Had you ever worked with her before that date?

A I honestly don't remember. I want to say I maybe worked with her maybe once -- once before. Maybe once or twice before.

Q Okay. You really didn't have a lot of knowledge or experience with her as a co-worker before this incident, would that be accurate?

A Yes, that is accurate to say.
Q Just quickly, when you testified you opened the doors or the doors were opened and you first saw what was happening, \(I\) just want to understand the positioning of the patient. Was he on his back?

A So our patient -- I forgot his name but, yes, when we loaded him onto our stretcher, we -what we do, it is called the immobilization. So we put him supine which would be, yes, on his back belly up onto a backboard to prevent him from further injuring possibly whatever kind of injury he has, right. Yes, he was on his back looking up
on a backboard and a C-collar which would also prevent him from moving his cervical area, his neck.

Q Was he restrained with any straps or anything, other than the C-collar?

A So he would have been restrained with seatbelts.

Q Okay.
A We have lower leg, mid thigh, and then \(I\) would say upper thoracic area where the seatbelts would land.

Q Okay. And, to your knowledge, those were in place and being used as restraints at the time you saw him?

A At the time we loaded him and packaged him up to transport him to the hospital, yes. At the time we unloaded him, I do not recall if they were still in place or not.

Q Fair enough. Lastly, so he's on his back supine as you have described. Can you just tell us Ms. Mazor's position in relation to him? Was she facing him? Just describe for me when you first saw what was happening.

A Yes. My partner, Ms. Mazor, as the doors
were opened, I remember her standing by the patient's upper torso you could say, the head area, leaning -- leaning downward basically onto him as he is holding her hair. Like holding her down. So she is basically bending over him, over our patient.

MR. PINELLI: Okay, that is all I needed to know. Thank you, very much. I have no further questions.

Does the board have any questions, board members?

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Any questions?
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Oscar, I apologize if this was asked earlier and I didn't catch it. But from the time you first heard Ms. Mazor state that she needed help and that your patient was pulling off his C-collar, how much time passed from that until you pulled up and parked the ambulance approximately?

MR. ORTEGA: I want to say it was probably -- it was maybe a minute, maybe even under a minute from the time -- from the time this happened I believe.

I know I wasn't far from the hospital
because I did ask a few times if she needed me to pull over and I remember telling her I am 20 minutes out -- or 20 seconds out or some sort of seconds, it wasn't very long, and she said just keep going since -- I believe since we were so close.

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Okay, thank you. No other questions.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any other questions?

MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: I do have a question, Mr. President.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Please go.
MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: I just want to make sure \(I\) am hearing this right. When Attorney Marconi was asking you a question, Oscar, he had mentioned in several of his questions he stated the patient on top of -- and I don't want to say the name incorrectly. What is the name of our member here?

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Elizabeth Mazor.
TRUSTEE CONYEARS-ERVIN: Ms. Mazor. He mentioned several times the patient on top of Ms. Mazor. So the patient was restrained but yet the
patient had Ms. Mazor's hair; is that correct? MR. ORTEGA: So our patient was on a backboard, with a C-collar, restrained onto our stretcher. It is how we transport all of our patients for the most part if it is a trauma, unless they want to sit up. But in this case, since he was on a backboard, he wasn't able to sit up. He was not on top of my partner. My partner was basically leaning over him because he's on a bed. He's on a bed basically reaching up with his hands on his head pulling -- pulling her down.

So if you can imagine my partner
basically having her head by the patient, who is laying on the bed, with my partner's head basically to our patient's shoulder, chest, head area, upper torso.

MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: I understand.
Thank you for clarification.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any other questions?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: I do have one question. Was your hair the way it is today, Ms. Mazor?

MS. MAZOR: No, sir. It was in a bun, per protocol, off my collar.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: The patient grabbed from behind then, obviously, and pulled you towards the stretcher?

MS. MAZOR: Yes. He grabbed the back of my bun and then as my bun was coming out, his hands got entangled into my hair.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Okay, thank you.
Any other questions?
MR. PINELLI: Mr. Marconi, do you have any followup or are we good?

MR. MARCONI: We are good. I don't have any followup.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you. We can release Mr. Ortega. Thank you, very much, sir, for being available. You may disengage us.

MR. ORTEGA: Thank you.
MR. PINELLI: That is done, now do you have another witness you wish to call?

MR. MARCONI: I am going to call Scott Mazor first. He will be shorter than Beth Mazor, if I can just yell his name. I have him out in the lobby, by the way, \(I\) know we talked about a motion
to exclude so that he can't hear the testimony so I have to get him and then bring him in here.

MR. PINELLI: Fine. Sure.
Good morning, sir. My name is Vince
Pinelli. I am an attorney for the Pension Fund.
Before you testify, \(I\) just need to put you under oath. Can you raise your right hand? (Witness sworn.)

MR. PINELLI: Thank you. You may proceed, counsel.

SCOTT MAZOR
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

EXAMINATION
BY MR. MARCONI:
Q Sir, if you would please state your name, and just spell your name for the -- I think there is a court reporter.

MR. PINELLI: This is being recorded, yes.

THE WITNESS: Scott Mazor. S-c-o-t-t
last name M-a-z-o-r.
BY MR. MARCONI:
Q Are you related or do you know the
applicant Beth Mazor?
A Yes, that is my wife.
Q How long have you been married?
A Nine years.
Q What year did you get married?
A 2012 .
Q Are you employed?
A Yes.
Q Where are you employed?
A Palos Heights Fire Protection District.
Q What is your occupation?
A I am a Lieutenant there.
Q So your rank is Lieutenant; is that correct?

A Correct.
Q How long have you been a firefighter?
A Firefighter total would be about 18, 19 years. I have been with Palos Heights for around 13, 14 years.

Q When you met Beth was she working at another ambulance service? She was not in Chicago, correct?

A No, she worked for Buzz Ambulance.
Q Where were you guys living when you got
married?
A Tinley Park.
Q Do you have children with Beth?
A Yes, two.

Q What are their ages?
A Our daughter is 11 and our son is 8.
Q During your marriage, do you remember when Beth got hired by the Chicago Fire Department?

A About 2014 because our son was two at the time.

Q Did you then move in -- sell your house in Tinley and then move into the City?

A Yeah, we had to sell our house in Tinley to move to the City. You have to be a resident within the City limits.

Q You currently live within the City of Chicago; is that correct?

A Yes, currently live within the City limits.

Q Now, the incident in this case occurred on January 11, 2017. I am assuming you were living with Beth at that point, correct?

A Yes.
Q Did you get a notification from her or
anyone while you were at work?
A Yes. I was at work and she called me telling me that a patient attacked her and that she is at the hospital, she's okay right now, and she will get back to me.

Q And then going into the early morning hours then, and \(I\) will go to January the 12 th, did you see Beth at home?

A Yes. When I got home -- I get home usually about 7:30 in the morning. My wife was sitting on the couch with our babysitter at the time and they were discussing some of the events that occurred and just how the children were when \(I\) got home.

Q As far as the Chicago Fire Department, did anyone show up from the Fire Department that morning?

A Maybe about an hour, hour and a half later, we had three members from the Chicago Fire Department show up sitting on our couch talking to Beth about the assault that occurred that day found out through the news.

Q Now I am going to kind of take you through some of the treatment that was rendered in
the records. Sticking within say a week of the incident, did you see anything unusual about Beth that you had not seen prior to January 11 th?

A She seemed to be more withdrawn more. She wouldn't be active. Wouldn't be talking as much.

Q Do you know whether or not she went back to work at that point?

A No, she still has not -- she still did not go back to work. I believe she was waiting on Medical.

Q So what happens -- what do you see next about Beth? I mean, do you guys try to go through life as normal at that point?

A We do. She doesn't go out.
Q I am going back to just after the incident.

A Yeah, she still wouldn't go out. She was nervous. She seemed very scared of everything that was going on. If there was a lot of noise in the house, it upset her.

Q At some point did you try to get away, to try to get away from the City, and see if that would help?

A Yeah. A couple of months after the attack, we attempted to go to Florida and just clear everyone's minds of what occurred.

Q Why Florida?
A Beth's parents owned a home in Naples.
Q Did you have the children with you?
A Yes, both of them.
Q Anything unusual happen during this trip?
A The first day was good. The second day I don't know what transpired but Beth -- she was different and \(I\) found her in the bedroom trying to take her own life. I had to rip pills out of her mouth to try to stop her.

Q Did she have notes around her?
A There were a few notes to the children.
Q You being a firefighter, did you call anyone at that point? Did you call an ambulance?

A We called an ambulance. The ambulance came. The fire department came. They transported her to the local ER. Where they were taking care of her mental and her medical conditions as well from what pills she took and the doctors there they performed a Baker Act on her.

Q Is that basically an involuntarily

\section*{commitment?}

A Yes, for a minimum of three days.
Q Did you stay in Florida or did you return back to Illinois?

A Me and the children -- after they did the Baker Act, me and the children returned back to Illinois. I had to work and the children had school.

Q Do you know if Beth stayed in Florida for a period of time?

A After she was released from the facility that she was transferred to due to the Baker Act, she stayed for a day or two with her parents and then her mother \(I\) believe flew home with her.

Q In the records, it indicates that you were present at a lot of these meetings that took place in the Medical Section; is that correct?

A That's correct.

Q Were you basically there to assist in setting up the treatment for your wife?

A Yes.
Q I mean to try to find providers and things?

A Yeah, I tried to find providers. What is
going on with my wife, there is not much resources around this area for her condition.

Q Now in the records, it indicates I think the first decision was to get her to a place called The Refuge; is that correct?

A That was after -- yes, The Refuge. That was provided and recommended to her from Park Royal, which is the facility she was at in Florida, and speaking with her therapist at the time he also referred and recommended that she go to The Refuge as well.

Q Had she been to Palos Hospital before that or did that come after The Refuge, if you recall?

A The first incident to Palos Hospital was when everything came out and we knew everything.

Q Would that have been earlier?
A Yeah.

Q Like in February, \(I\) think?
A I believe so yes.

Q What happened with regard to that? Were you involved in getting her hospitalized there?

A Yeah. I got a phone call at work that my wife self-harmed and she needed help. So when I
arrived home, there was an ambulance, a chief and five squad cars, at my house in the middle of the night with my children awake.

My wife had self-harmed and we had to contact the EAP and they helped us arrange for her to be transported to Palos Hospital.

Q When you say you EAP is that the Employee Assistance Program with the Chicago Fire Department?

A Yes.
Q Were you having difficulty at that point because they wanted to transport her to a Chicago hospital, instead of Palos?

A Yeah.
Q Okay. So she ended up in Palos; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q For how long, do you remember?
A I believe once again they did the involuntary committal so a minimum of three days.

Q Just so we're clear, this is before the Florida trip to try to get away from everything, correct?

A Correct.
\(\square\)
Q Who decided on The Refuge? I know you just said that Park Royal recommended that. Was that something that had to be approved by the City?

A We did have to go get approval from the Medical Section in the City because it is out of the City limits. But it is the only place that we were able to find that treats and helps for PTSD.

Q Did you go with her to take her to The Refuge the first time or did she go on her own?

A I flew down with her and we -- The Refuge sets up where they have a driver pick the patient up at the hospital. So once Beth was with them, then she went on her way to the treatment center, and \(I\) went back home, right back onto a plane back home.

Q Beth remained there for a period of time; is that correct?

A She remained there until insurance ran out.

Q Were there insurance issues with the completion of her stay there?

A Yeah. It was about 30 days \(I\) believe is all the insurance granted. And then me talking with our finance people, instead of just kicking
her out right away, \(I\) had to pay a couple of thousands of dollars to get her to stay for a couple of extra days for a discharge plan.

Q So she stayed a couple more days and then she was discharged, correct?

A Correct.
Q What was the plan then once -- what was the plan after her discharge?

A The plan was to continue therapy or find a therapist for PTSD and continue treatment for the PTSD with the therapist and psychiatrist.

Q And now there is a therapist, psychiatrist or psychologist, Dr. Hoover. I think it is Marlin Hoover?

A Correct.
Q Did you ever meet this person?
A Yes, once or twice.
Q Do you know how you or Beth found Dr.
Hoover to treat with?
A I believe he was one of the doctors at the stay at Palos Hospital that they give.

Q Now as far as when she's going through this, now she is back to Chicago, how was she -what were your observations of how she was doing?

A After The Refuge, she seemed better and then it was a roller coaster. There would be good days, bad days. More bad days than good.

Q I am assuming the kids were at home; is that right?

A Yes.
Q Did you have any help with the kids?
A Yes. My family or a lot of the time we had to get a babysitter. Even when I was at work, we would have a babysitter to help Beth out with the kids. There would be certain things that Beth wouldn't be able to do. Take them to school due to the crowds, the noise, and just help out with them.

Q So it appears at some point when she gets back, she also got referred to Timberline Knolls I think the place is?

A Sounds about right.
Q Were you involved in that at all?
A No.
Q Leading up to June, I think there was another incident in June. What was going on just before her second stay at Palos as far as what you could see, her behavior?

A She was very withdrawn. She wouldn't go
outside. Not talkative a lot. She would spend a lot of time isolated. And then it got to her. You know, she kept telling me the video constantly plays in my head. The video constantly plays in my head. And the video which \(I\) am referring to is the sexual assault that was occurred on her back in January.

Q So the records indicate that she is again admitted on June 12 th to Palos. Do you remember that?

A Once again, \(I\) was at work. I got a phone call. She told me I don't feel well. Can you please come home. I came home. She had self-harmed a few times on her leg and she just said she just wants the video to stop. Can you please take me to the hospital?

And that is when we called the ambulance to come take her and we had to fight once again to get her transported to Palos Hospital.

Q Because they wanted to take her somewhere in the City; is that correct?

A Correct.
Q Was she admitted inpatient then at Palos?
A Yes.
\(\square\) that picked her up then?

A Yeah. After her stay, yes.
Q What was the plan after that?

A I believe to find new therapists that could help her better.

Q There was a therapist who was referenced in the records Cody Todd. Do you know if that was one of her first therapists?

A That was one in the middle, around the June timeframe. She -- her specialty is PTSD for first responders so we thought we found a good fit by going to her.

Q Did it seem to work for a period of time?
A For a period of time.
Q Now in the records there is an indication then, \(I\) think July 7, about an admission to the use of heroine. Prior to getting married or up until July 7th, did you ever know that Beth ever had abused heroine earlier in her life \(I\) believe after she got out of the military?

A No. No.

Q Okay. As far as you could see leading up until this incident, had you ever seen Beth abuse
any type of prescription drugs?
A No.

Q Do you know whether she was even on prescription drugs?

A No.
Q So what happens on July 7 th?
A She called me at work and she told me that she just did heroine. She wanted -- it would stop the movie and she wanted help. So she self-reported that she did it to me and that she was at home when she did it.

Q So she was not caught or not arrested or no overdose; is that correct?

A No. No. No.
Q To the best of your knowledge, and I realize that you are not with Beth \(24 / 7\), was this the only time that she used the heroine?

A Yes. She's very truthful and forthcoming and for her to call me and tell me that, she would have told me if there was something prior.

Q Now after this, then did that lead to another trip back to Florida to go to The Refuge?

A Yeah. First we called Rosecrance and they accepted her. And they gave her some
promises, that her service dog could be with her and stay, and that she will be on the floor with all firemen and paramedics.

That wasn't the case. They didn't fulfill any of the promises. It was more of a jail and prison to her. She needs her dog, her service dog, to help her get through the day.

So I contacted The Refuge again. Talked to the same finance person. They made contact with the insurance company and they said that she could come back to The Refuge.

So we went, signed her out of Rosecrance. She had less than 12 hours home, we packed and me and her got on a plane, flew her back down to Florida.

Q This program at Rosecrance is that the Florian Program I think they call it that is basically --

A I believe so, yes.
Q She was never admitted into that program as far as you know?

A No.
Q So she again went to The Refuge. She then came home early; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q When she gets back home, what is she doing as far as treatment?

A We found her a new therapist and a new psychiatrist and she is with them still to this day.

Q Okay. And that is -- I think it is Dr. Sandhu, correct?

A Correct, that is the psychiatrist. Dr. Heather Cody is her therapist.

Q Okay. So she still sees Heather Cody on a regular basis?

A Yes.
Q As far as you can see is she consistent with her appointments?

A Yes. The only time she would miss a day is if the therapist was on vacation or sick.

Q Okay. Now throughout this time were you trying to get back a sense of normalcy in your life with the kids?

A Yes.
Q At some point did you try to take another Florida vacation or a Florida cruise with Beth alone?

A Yeah. We tried to go on a -- the past -you know, since the attack, it's been rough. So our kids, they have been through a lot, too, with all this.

So we tried to give them a Disney cruise vacation back in December of 2019. We flew down to Miami. My wife Beth she made it maybe four hours. She couldn't -- she couldn't do it. There was too many people. She disassociated. She didn't even realize she was in Miami anymore. She asked to go back home. So she flew back home. She was picked up by family members which then who stayed with her for about the week.

She didn't want me and the children to come home because she didn't want the vacation to be ruined for them because they were excited to be there.

Q Okay. As far as, in general \(I\) am talking about, even now is there a difference between what you guys would do socially now as opposed to prior to January 11 th?

A Yeah, prior to the attack, you know, we could get in the car and go to the store. We could do whatever we wanted to do. The children -- you
know, my wife would go to the kid's games. Now it is completely different. We have to plan if we want to go to the grocery store. You know, what time of the day are we going to go? What store are we going to, it depends on how many people are around.

My wife she hasn't -- she maybe went to one basketball game of my daughter's last year. It is too loud. There is too many people. There is whistles.

My son's hockey, the sound of the puck hitting the boards in hockey is the same sound that the back of the ambulance makes when it closes. It brings my wife Beth back to being in the ambulance.

Q So there are good periods of time,
though, correct?

A There are, yes.
Q And then what happens? I mean, does the sense of normalcy come back to your life?

A Yes, briefly. And then a noise will go off. Or, you know, the sound of a siren from, you know, an ambulance may put her into start not - withdrawing from us or stop talking.

Q Does she seem to be doing better lately?

A Yes.
Q And, again, \(I\) know that there is these records from this Amy Shanahan in the exhibits.

Did you ever meet Amy Shanahan?

A No.

Q Did you know that she was going to have the EMDR with Amy Shanahan?

A Yes, I did.
Q Did that seem to help Beth a lot?
A It did.
Q How so? I mean, how would you know?

A Beth would tell me about it. She would talk about, you know, what she went through and how she feels after doing it.

Q Did you see noticeable changes that she was definitely improving?

A Yes.
Q Does she still have a good relationship with Dr. Sandhu?

A Yes, she still sees him.

Q And she still sees Heather Cody; is that correct?

A Yes, at a minimum once a week.
Q In your opinion from what you could
observe yourself, does Beth seem to be putting forth a lot of effort to get better so to speak?

A Absolutely. She is trying every day, you know. She tries to brave going outside more. She tries to brave going out. And she goes to every appointment that she is given and she -- even leading up to this, we setup where she went prior to this and she also has an appointment after this because she cares about taking care of herself and the treatment.

Anniversaries, we get multiple appointments with her therapists and we don't do anything coming up to anniversaries or big dates related to the attack.

Q But you are optimistic for the future based on her efforts?

A Even though she's trying her -- she is doing everything she can, there is still a lot of unknowns out there that could occur. The site of seeing an accident, being in a crowd of people, not knowing who is there, there is a lot that goes into it all.

MR. MARCONI: Okay. Vince, I don't have anything else.

MR. PINELLI: Mr. President, should I proceed or do you want to see if the trustees have anything?

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: I don't think anyone has any questions.

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: I have no questions.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: There are no questions so please proceed.

MR. PINELLI: Okay, thank you.
EXAMINATION
BY MR. PINELLI:

Q I just have a quick question getting back to the witness. Mr. Mazor, just a couple of quick questions.

A Okay.
Q Sir, you said you got married in 2012?
A Yes.
Q How long did you know Beth before 2012?
A About a couple of a years.
Q Okay. Were you dating or did you just know her during that two years?

A Dating.
Q Okay. And then how long has she had the service dog?

A It would be her first trip to The Refuge so that would be -- we are going on I believe three years.

Q Okay. So it was after the incident that for the first time --

A Oh, yeah, it was after the attack.
MR. PINELLI: Okay, that is all I have.
MR. MAZOR: Okay.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any
questions?
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: No questions, Vince.
MR. PINELLI: Thank you.
Counsel, next witness.
MR. MARCONI: I call Beth Mazor.
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Good luck to you. Be safe.

MR. MAZOR: Thank you.
MR. MARCONI: Just for the record, Vince, do you want Scott -- do you want him out in the hallway?

MR. PINELLI: Now that he's done testifying, if he wants to sit in the room, he can.

MR. MARCONI: Scott, it's up to you, if
you want to sit in here.
He is going to take the service dog.
MR. PINELLI: Counsel, before you start, of course, \(I\) will swear in the witness but \(I\) just ask you to be mindful of the time here. As you know, we always have a docket with a lot of other business that the Board has to attend to. So we appreciate, you know, whatever you can do to streamline the presentation given the fact that the Board has, you know, all of the exhibits and has had the opportunity to review them.

MR. MARCONI: Right and I appreciate it. That is why \(I\) wanted to call Scott first to kind of lay a background. I don't intend to go over the same things and be cumulative and repetitive.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you. We appreciate that.

Ms. Mazor, could you raise your right hand, please?
(Witness sworn.)
ELIZABETH MAZOR
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

BY MR. MARCONI:
Q Ms. Mayor, how old are you?
A I just turned 41.
Q Just briefly, what is your education?

A I graduated high school, took a little bit of college, and then \(I\) was a licensed paramedic.

Q Military service?
A Yes, \(I\) was in the Army.
Q What did you do in the Army?
A I was a parachute rigger. A 92 Romeo.

Q Did you get hurt?
A I did. I broke my left hip on an
airborne training.
Q Were you honorably discharged?
A Yes, I was.
Q Now, obviously, from your application, we know you're a paramedic; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q Was that your first paramedic job or did you have other experience being a paramedic?

A I had other experience prior.
Q Where did you -- just briefly, where did you work prior as a paramedic?

A Most of my time was spent at Buzz
Ambulance, which is a private ambulance that covers 13 cities in the south suburbs. I also worked for Steger Estates Fire Department. And then for a short time St. James Ambulance out of St. James Hospital.

Q Is being a paramedic pretty much all you have done since getting out of the military?

A Yes. It is all I know.

Q Do you remember -- I think the records indicate that you went with the City fire department was it like 2015?

A Yes. About then, yes.
Q Scott already testified that that is when you moved into the city, correct?

A Correct.

Q Now as far as your assignments, I am assuming you had multiple assignments; is that correct?

A I had two basically. When \(I\) got on as an FPM, I was assigned to Ambulance 74 out of Engine 13's house Downtown and then when I took the promotion to PIC I was placed in South Relief.

Q What is a PIC?

A Paramedic in Charge.
Q How does that relate to just a regular paramedic?

A It is a promotional. You're more in charge of the ambulance, you are in charge of the inventory, making sure everyone is safe and that everyone goes home.

Q So you -- I showed you a copy of your application that contains your affidavit; is that correct?

A Yes, sir.

Q And everything in there is accurate; is that correct?

A Correct.

Q I will just -- and partly this is due to my fault the way \(I\) framed the questions to Mr . Ortega, but the positioning within the ambulance when this happened, and \(I\) am not going to go into great detail, you started answering the question regarding your hair. So can you just kind of expound upon that?

A Sure. With the uniform, per policy, our hair cannot touch our collars. As you see my hair is very long. It was placed in a bun where it all
comes off the collar. Nothing is touching and it is completely secured in the back.

Q All right. You were describing how this individual, \(I\) think his name is Roy Hall, initially grabbed your bun; is that correct?

A As it happened, he started to get combative and \(I\) was trying to get away from him to walk along the side.

At first he grabbed my radio strap and that knocked me off balance because he pulled me forward. After he pulled me forward, my knees were on the ground and my body was laying over him like my chest and up and then he grabbed a hold of my bun because while you are laying in that position you have free range of your hands and your arms. He grabbed a hold of my bun. He then had control over my head and he placed my head over his crotch and then he began pushing my head down into his crotch and telling me to suck his fucking dick.

I was trying to get away from him. He started punching my in the ribs on my right side. I was able to back away a bit and he still had my hair.

Then he pulled my head over by his face
and he tried to get me to kiss him and he just smelled like alcohol.

And then he tried to pull me more and said just get up and bounce, bitch, you know what to do.

And then \(I\) just -- he started going for my neck and \(I\) just couldn't fight and \(I\) couldn't scream. I couldn't do anything.

And then when we were coming, we hit the curbing going into the Northwestern Hospital. And it got him off me enough that \(I\) was able to at least push away and start to stand up. He still had the radio strap and he still had my hair.

My partner then knew something was going on and he came in. He got him off the radio strap and it ended up breaking the leather radio straps that the City gives us.

And then the security guard was pulling him off my hair and \(I\) could -- sorry. I could hear the hair being pulled out of my head as he was trying to get him off of me.

And that is pretty much -- I was able to get free and \(I\) got out the side door and then they brought the patient in and then it took a lot of
security guards to hold him down.
Q All right. Beth, you didn't return to work after that; is that correct?

A That was my last day.
Q I am going to go through -- I don't think you were here for Scott's testimony, correct?

A No.

Q So I am going to kind of just go through some of the high points and not try to repeat what Scott said.

The following next day there were people that showed up from the fire department?

A Yes, sir.
Q To kind of help you and whatever; is that correct?

A Yes, sir.
Q Did you try to just shake this off initially?

A I thought -- I thought I'd be fine and I would just get back to work.

Q I know from the records there was a progression where \(I\) think that you weren't fine and then I think it was February I think you ended up being taken to Palos; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q What was going through your head? I mean, \(I\) know it was classified as a suicide attempt but why?

A I had a friend over. We were
celebrating. She was actually getting into the fire academy.

At the time \(I\) was smoking cigarettes. I went outside to smoke and when I stood up I fell and \(I\) hit my knee. The pain from my knee made what -- I refer to it as the movie in my head because \(I\) just kept on replaying the scene and replaying the incident and thinking what \(I\) should have done different to get out of it. And when my knee hurt that -- those images stopped. But after some time my knee stopped hurting so I took a knife and I cut my hand trying to make pain so that \(I\) didn't keep thinking about it.

Q And then, I mean, did somebody call an ambulance then?

A Yes. I called a friend from the job. I scared myself when \(I\) did that. It was very out of character for me. I called a friend from the job and she ended up calling the police, ambulance,
might have had a Field Chief there, I don't really recall.

Q So you were released, correct?
A Yes.

Q So do you start treating with anyone right away?

A Yes. From Palos Hospital, \(I\) was never given a protocol of anything to do. Palos referred me to a psychiatrist and a psychologist so I started seeing Dr. Marlin Hoover, a therapist.

Q So now the Board has Dr. Hoover's records. That is somebody who you treated with initially; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q And you have a good relationship with Dr. Hoover?

A I love Dr. Hoover.
Q Was it your understanding that he had diagnosed you with PTSD?

A Yes.

Q Had you ever had any -- from what -- your military or your years between that any issues with PTSD?

A No, sir.
\(\square\)
Q Any issues with any of the symptoms that you were experiencing after this incident?

A No.

Q Was this all more or less new to you?

A It was very new.
Q So I think you start seeing Dr. Hoover in February. There is the trip, and the Board already knows about, the trip to Florida. Your parents live there or live there during the winter; is that correct?

A Yes.

Q It was kind of a getaway; is that correct?

A Yes, sir.
Q There was another issue that happens in Florida. What possessed you to do that? I mean, Scott testified there was an issue with regard to pills.

A Yeah. The thoughts, the movie, the events, it just didn't stop ever. It is all -closed my eyes, it was there. I had my eyes open, I slept, it was there. I was awake it was there. I didn't want it to be there any more so I tried to take my life by ingesting my own medicine.
Q Then Scott came in?
A Yeah. He found me like in the process of it.

Q You were admitted again; is that correct?
A Correct.

Q Then you were involuntarily committed I think, correct?

A Yes.
Q You remained there. You then stayed with your parents; is that correct?

A Yes. Once \(I\) got released, yeah.
Q The records indicate then at some point after that you go to Timberline Knolls. The records indicate you left early. I just want to give the Board a reason as to what -- an explanation as to what happened there.

A Timberline Knolls is an eating disorder center and they were not qualified. They did not have the staffing to accommodate a trauma like mine.

Q Was this the same -- I am thinking of Rosecrance that has the Florian Program?

A That is Rosecrance does.

Q In your mind, you didn't think Timberline
was a good fit; is that correct?
A Correct.

Q Did you seek out other treatment?
A I did. The City recommended me to Timberline Knolls. The City recommended me to Insight, which was another eating disorder center. I was told not to talk about my trauma there because it would trigger the other clients.

The Florian Program is one \(I\) tried to enter. They did not have the staffing to accommodate my service dog. I had to be accompanied by staff to go let my service dog out to the bathroom, that was not fair to my service dog.

And the reason for going to Rosecrance was because they had the Florian Program there, which is dedicated just to firefighter paramedics, with staff that can treat the trauma and the same that firefighter paramedics go through.

Q You were never put in that program; is that correct?

A I never made it to it.
Q Now, with regard to Palos, there was a second admission then; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q How long did you remain there?
A I think it was just a 72-hour hold, like a three-day hold.

Q Why was that?
A I was having a very hard time.
Struggling. I was disassociating a lot where you kind of -- you leave your body. You don't feel real anymore. And \(I\) made a very large cut in my leg to kill myself and to know that \(I\) was real.

Q Okay. And then how did you get there? Via ambulance? Did somebody drive you there?

A Chicago picked me up, an ambulance, yes.
Q Okay. All right. You get out of Palos for the second time and then where do you go? Do you go into treatment right away?

A I don't -- when \(I\) went to Palos, it might have been when \(I\) went to The Refuge.

Q Okay. I want to talk to you something about, Scott brought it up a little bit, there is a lot in the records about heroin use and some type of substance abuse and \(I\) know that when you get labeled then you have to go through certain treatment. July 7, 2017, what happened?

A I was in Insight, the eating disorder center, where \(I\) was told by my therapist that I couldn't talk about my trauma in group. I was backtracking. All my PTSD symptoms were getting worse.

I also knew that to go into the Florian Program you had to be dual diagnosis, which would mean like depression and drugs or depression and alcohol. PTSD, alcohol, drugs. So I bought heroine and used it, self-reported.

Q To whom?

A To my husband and my family. And then I was able to go seek more treatment.

Q Was this the only -- apart from when you were younger, which is in the records that you abused heroin I think when you were 15,16 years old, apart from that was this the only time that you used heroin?

A Yes, it was the only time.
Q As far as your drinking is concerned, did you regard yourself as a drinker back then? Do you regard yourself as a drinker now?

A No, I do not. Did not, do not.
Q So after the self-report, did things then
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change with regard to the Fire Department Medical
Section?

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A Yes. I was taken off of a duty status because of the drug use. They said that that was not in correlation to the PTSD.

Q And then things started to change at that point; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q That is when you had these other tests that -- from doctors that were hired by the City; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q Was that mainly focused on substance abuse or was it focused on your PTSD?

A There was really no talk about the sexual assault, the physical assault. Most of it revolved around my drug abuse, drug use as a teenager, and my relapse with the PTSD.

Q Okay. One of the things that are in the records, and \(I\) just want to touch upon it --

Are we okay?
MR. PINELLI: You're okay, Just a brief interruption. Go head, sorry about that.

BY MR. MARCONI:
\(\square\) efforts to return back to work. Did you make -- I will call them aggressive or some very -- make strong efforts to get returned back to the job?

A I did. I tried very hard. It was really all \(I\) wanted. Being a paramedic is my passion. It is what \(I\) wanted to get back to.

Q Did you use the Union's resources and assistance in trying to get back?

A I did. They were very helpful.
Q And were they pretty much aggressively trying to help you out?

A Yes, they were.
Q Did you try to seek an accommodation with the City to at least get you back, maybe not on an ambulance, but to get you back working to see if you can handle an ambulance?

A Yes, sir. I was told about the reasonable accommodation process through the ADA that could place me in a position other than EMS in an ambulance. So \(I\) filled out the reasonable accommodation paperwork.

And then \(I\) was told that if \(I\) could get my Lead Instructor certification, I could go into
the MARC Division on my reasonable accomodation. I went down to Southern Illinois and I completed the class. Passed the class. When I brought that back down to Medical, they said that they would not waive the five years needed to get into the MARC Division and were not honoring my accommodation paperwork.

Q So at that point none of your doctors had released you back to full duty in an ambulance; is that correct?

A Correct.

Q Then according to the records, there came a time where \(I\) think they said your year is up and they wanted you to basically sign a resignation; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q Did you refuse?
A I refused.

Q As far as you know is there currently still a grievance regarding your involuntarily separation from the fire department?

A Yes, there is.
Q Getting back to the reasonable accommodation, after this happened with regard to
the involuntary separation, then there was no light duty or there was no accommodations at that point; is that correct?

A There was nothing.
Q Now despite this, you did finish the program at Rosecrance that was requested by the City; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q Were you hopeful -- were you following all of the conditions that were made by the Department in order to come back?

A I was.
Q And did they give you some hope that you would come back? I think you had to wait a year of absence; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q Did they wait that full year of absence?
A Yes.
Q And they would not take you back?
A They would not. I was one month from the one year that they were looking for.

Q So you didn't make the one year?
A I did not make the one year.
Q That was not through your fault, that is
because the Department --
A Correct.

Q -- had let you the go?
A Correct.
Q Now as far as there is -- I think there is a misstatement throughout the records. In a lot of the reports, they refer to Dr. Gokhale; is that correct?

A Yes.

Q And I think that he's even in some of the -- I will call them title pages in the Board's records. You have never seen a Dr. Gokhale; is that correct?

A I have not.
Q But Dr. Sandhu; is that correct?
A That is correct.
Q And I think that Tracey Bilut, who is their independent contractor, I think correctly identified those records. That is your treater; right?

A Yes, that is correct, he is my doctor.
Q Dr. Gokhale was never your treating physician. It was always Dr. Sandhu.

A Correct.
\(Q\) Now, I asked Scott a little bit about Amy Shanahan. I just want to briefly touch on her. She was a therapist but she was a very specialized therapist; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q What did she do?
A EMDR.
Q And do you want to say it or do you want me to say it?

A You can say it. I get it jumbled.
Q Is it the Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing?

A That is it.
Q From your perspective, what were you doing with Amy Shanahan that seemed to help you with the PTSD?

A With EMDR, it takes memories that are stuck, as in with PTSD, and it files them into proper things. It uses bilateral stimulation to activate the right and left hemisphere of the brain. So \(I\) would hold paddles that vibrated from left to right while thinking of an event and how that event made me feel and we would work through it and process it until \(I\) took the power back over
that event.
Q And just so it's clear, I mean, it wasn't just solely about the incident that happened on January 11th. There was other things in your childhood that would come up as well that you were working on those, too; is that correct?

A Yes.

Q Did that form of treatment seem to help?
A Yes. The EMDR was very beneficial.
Q Are you currently doing that right now?
A I am not. Amy and I -- I have what is called graduated EMDR. I have come to the end of how she feels she can help me. You know, I still have PTSD but I am much more capable of dealing with it and handling any kind of triggers or stress responses because of the EMDR. I am welcome back at any time, if \(I\) have a reoccurrence of symptoms. Yes.

Q Do you feel like you have made a lot of progress with this type of treatment?

A Yes, it was very good progress.
Q And then to supplement this treatment, the records indicate that you have been treating with Heather Cody I believe?

A That is correct.
Q How long have you been treating with Heather Cody?

A Been two and a half, three of the years, it's been a long time.

Q Heather Cody is that basically talk therapy; is that correct?

A Yes.
Q How frequently do you see Heather Cody?
A It depends. Normally it is once a week, but if we are coming up to like an anniversary, the anniversary of the assault, suicide attempt anniversary or any City related incidents, we might have two appointments a week just to make sure I'm okay. Like I have an appointment -- I had one Wednesday and I have one tomorrow following today.

Q In the records, it clearly indicates just the whole Pension Board process -- it looks like this was -- maybe I wasn't involved yet. You thought it was going to go to a hearing a while back?

A Correct.

Q And that would cause additional stress or whatever?

A Yes. Correct.
Q That is the fear of the unknown?

A Yes.
Q So what is your -- the Board has a lot of your records, okay. But what is your current intention? I mean, what are you trying to do now to help yourself, to get back to work, to do something? I mean, once this process, this pension process, is over.

A I am -- I will never quit. I am going to continue working towards overcoming the assault and PTSD. I still plan to press through with the grievance on the City. Hopefully, one day \(I\) will be returning back to work.

Q So you feel like you have made strides in the last year more so with Amy Shanahan?

A Yes.
Q And you have learned now at least how to deal better when symptoms arise?

A Yes.

Q This is not the first time you testified about the attack; is that correct?

A That is correct.
Q Did you go through a criminal trial where
you took the witness stand in front of a jury and a judge?

A Yes.
Q And went through it, correct?
A Yes.

Q And were cross examined?
A Yes.

Q And as far as people at work, especially the Union, do you feel that they were supportive of you?

A They were very supportive.
MR. MARCONI: Vince, I don't have anything else.

MR. PINELLI: Okay. Mr. President?
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any
questions?
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Hearing none, Vince.
EXAMINATION
BY MR. PINELLI:

Q I have a few questions, Ms. Mazor.
A Sure.
Q The record shows that you -- I think you testified you entered in 2015, but the records we
have show September 16th of 2014. Would you defer to those records as far as the actual date?

A I had an entry date that should have been in '14. I was injured originally at the academy and \(I\) was recycled in a secondary academy.

Q Okay. So that happened in '15 then by the time you graduated?

A I believe so.

Q Prior to coming on the Department, you mentioned you had some history of drug abuse --

A Yes, sir.

Q -- in your early years. How about treatment for mental health conditions? Did you have any of that before you came on the Department?

A I was never treated specifically for a mental health condition as far as with a therapist or a psychiatrist. I did visit my primary care physician to deal with some seasonal depression as well as difficulty sleeping that was causing a bit of anxiety around bedtime with the lack of sleep.

Q Okay. You went off paid layup time sometime in 2017 , based on the records \(I\) have seen. Does that sound right?

A Yes, sir. When \(I\) went to The Refuge --

I'm sorry, were you still talking?
Q I was. I was just trying to lay a background. So I just wanted to establish you went off paid leave in 2017, correct?

A Yes, sir.
Q And then you didn't apply for this disability benefit until March 21st of 2019, correct?

A Yes, sir. Correct.
Q Can you tell us why you delayed applying for this benefit?

A The original time that \(I\) was taken off of my duty status is when \(I\) went to The Refuge in Florida. Because of the City's policy that we cannot leave the state nor the City while we are injured, \(I\) had to have special clearance through the Medical Division to go. In that, the stipulation was that \(I\) had to sign myself non-duty and then when \(I\) returned \(I\) would come back to a duty status.

And then as for waiting so long, on my last day with the City, \(I\) was very confident that \(I\) was going to be let back to work. I had worked very hard to come back and \(I\) was not given that
opportunity. Being a paramedic is all \(I\) know. It's my passion. And \(I\) could not walk away from the job without trying. So \(I\) went back to an old job to try to rehab to see if \(I\) could do it and \(I\) found out that \(I\) couldn't and that is when \(I\) put the application in.

Q So you are referring to your job at the Steger Estates Fire Department or District?

A Yes, sir.

Q And then you also worked at Navy Pier part-time, too?

A That is correct.
Q And you're saying that you did both of those to try to get your skills and your work back to see if you could do full-time paramedic work? Is that why you did those jobs?

A Yes. I could not have walked away from my career by the City telling me that \(I\) couldn't come back to work. This is all \(I\) know.

Q Why did you leave those positions, those two positions?

A The anniversary came up in January. The anniversary has always been rough. It always comes with an increase in my PTSD symptoms. When that
anniversary came about, that is when I -- I just -I was not ready to come back.

Q Okay. Now were the job duties as paramedic that you did for those two jobs similar to what you do in your paramedic job with the City?

A When \(I\) worked at the Navy Pier, I was an EMT. I was a lower level of care. Very quiet, especially during the winter, because it is shutdown for the most part.

Steger Estates I was a paramedic. They are a very, very small, maybe a mile or two district, and we run very few calls a year. We don't have the workload that Chicago has.

Q And the grievance you filed with the City, that is -- the grievance part is over. It is now pending an arbitration hearing; is that correct?

A I don't know too much about the process but I believe that is.

Q Have you been told anything about when that might happen?

A No.
Q Okay. It sounds like from your testimony that your symptoms related to the PTSD have gotten
better from right after the incident. Would you agree with that?

A From right after the incident, yes.
Q And are you currently working?
A No, sir.
Q What is the last job that you had worked?
A Steger Estates in -- was it '19? 2020
was coronavirus.
Q You mentioned this attempt --
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Vince, I have a question, please.

MR. PINELLI: Sure.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Do you currently have a paramedic license?

MS. MAZOR: I do.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Okay. Thank you. BY MR. PINELLI:

Q You mentioned that attempt for the accommodation and I didn't understand what you said about the five year requirement for the program. Could you just explain to me what that requirement is and how close you were to having it?

A There is a list of a few requirements to enter into like the MARC Division. I believe you
had to possibly be A PIC. You had to have five years on-the-job and you had to have the Lead Instructor or some sort of background in teaching. And at the time \(I\) was maybe approximately three years on the job.

Q Three years as -- on the job total versus three years as a PIC?

A Correct. Three years in total.
MR. PINELLI: Okay. Thank you, that is all the questions \(I\) have at this time.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any questions?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Hearing none, Vince.
MEMBER TEBBENS: I have one question.
The status change from duty to non-duty you said that was so you could seek treatment out of state; is that correct?

MS. MAZOR: That is correct. Chief of Medical made me sign to go non-duty out-of-pocket so that \(I\) could leave the state for adequate treatment.

MEMBER TEBBENS: And you are claiming the statement was made that you would be returned to
duty status when you would return?
MS. MAZOR: That is correct. There was even paperwork on it.

MEMBER TEBBENS: You have documentation to support that and conversations?

MS. MAZOR: Yes, sir.
MR. MARCONI: It is in your exhibits. I did see that \(I\) think in the Medical Section notes.

MEMBER TEBBENS: Okay.
MR. PINELLI: Any other questions?
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: No more questions.
MR. PINELLI: Jerry, no rehabilitation?
Can we move to the doctor?
MR. MARCONI: Yes, sir.
MR. PINELLI: Then you rest your case at this point?

MR. MARCONI: I do.
MR. PINELLI: Then \(I\) would call Dr. Samo to testify. Doctor, could you raise your right hand?
(Witness sworn.)
DANIEL SAMO, M.D.
a witness herein, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:


A Yes.

Q In that capacity do you review medical records, examine applicants and report to the Board?

A Yes.
Q Did you follow that procedure with respect to Ms. Mazor?

A Yes.
Q Did you file a written report with the Board that is marked as Board Exhibit Number 2 ?

A Yes.
Q Doctor, first of all, before you wrote your report, was Ms. Mazor sent for an independent medical exam?

A Yes.
Q And by whom was she sent?

A By the Board.
Q And who did she see?

A She saw Dr. Stevan Weine.
Q Are you familiar with Dr. Weine and his qualifications?

A Yes.
Q Just generally, what are his main qualifications to do this IME?

A Well, Dr. Weine is a psychiatrist at NorthShore. He is very much involved in trauma, PTSD, stress. He's known worldwide. He travels to war zones to work with victims of trauma and war trauma and rape and all those sorts of things. He does research in this area. He is highly, highly qualified in this area.

Q Did he issue a written report to the Board that is marked as Board Exhibit Number 3 ?

A Yes.

Q Can you briefly -- because \(I\) know it is a long report, but could you summarize your understanding of what his findings were after he did his IME?

A He found that, \(I\) will just go to his diagnoses, that she had major depression which was
resolved. She had opioid use and that was also resolved. She had \(A D H D\) and that is from childhood. She had PTSD which was still present but improved but really thought she had more stress related symptoms of hypervigilance and avoidance.

And he felt basically that she would not be able to perform as a paramedic in the fire department.

Q Did he do an in-person examination of her?

A Yes.

Q Now after you received that report, then did you do your own examination of her?

A Yes.
Q And your report is also marked as Board Exhibit Number 2; is that correct?

A Correct.
Q Doctor, with respect to your findings, did you agree or disagree with Dr. Weine's findings?

A I agreed. I thought that the review of records was similar to mine and findings were similar to mine and \(I\) also was of the opinion that she would not be able to function as a paramedic.
\(\square\) 2019 per the report?

A Yes.
Q At that time was she manifesting any symptoms that you -- or reporting any symptoms to you that were consistent with that diagnosis and treatment?

A Oh, yes. She had multiple symptoms. Depression, anxiety, hypervigilance, flashbacks, nightmares, the whole litany of PTSD symptoms.

Q Now did you also prior to today's date review some additional records that were provided to the board, Board's Exhibits 18, 19 and 20, of more current treatment of her since the time you had examined her?

A Yes.
Q And what did those records indicate to you at all about her condition as it existed after the time you examined her?

A As she stated, her therapy, the eye movement technique, really seemed to help her significantly. Her symptoms had improved a lot. However, she still was having a significant amount of symptomatology. Although she was improved, she
was still having a lot of problems.
The last visit with the psychiatrist was January 11 th of '21 and from Ms. Cody on February 17 th.

Ms. Cody had also done a PTSD checklist. It is called a PCL-5. She scored 33 on that. The cutoff for where they say it is probable PTSD on this test is between 31 and 33 . So still having a significant number of symptoms.

MR. PINELLI: Thank you, doctor, that is all the questions \(I\) have at this time.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustees, any questions for the doctor?

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: No questions.
MR. PINELLI: Mr. Marconi, any questions for the doctor?

MR. MARCONI: Just a couple.
EXAMINATION

BY MR. MARCONI:
Q Dr. Samo, it sounds like we share the same opinion of Dr. Weine. But in addition to what Vince brought out, and \(I\) think it is through INSPE, Dr. Weine does evaluate a lot of police officers and firefighters for claims of PTSD, correct?

A Yes.
Q This isn't like new for him in terms of coming and submitting a report to a pension board? He does a lot of pension work?

A He does a lot of pension work. Again, mostly -- it is all psychiatric and a lot of that is PTSD.

Q I was looking in the exhibit. I think his CV is about 32 pages long. So he's eminently qualified worldwide to give opinions about PTSD?

A Yes.

MR. MARCONI: Thank you.
MR. PINELLI: No further questions on that.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Thank you.
MR. PINELLI: The applicant having rested and that being the conclusion of evidence in this matter at this time.

MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, I'd like to make a motion to go into executive session pursuant to Sections 2(c) 4 and 2(c)11 of the Open Meetings Act.

motion.

    MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.

Conyears-Ervin.
    MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
    CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.
    MEMBER SONI: Yes.
    CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips.
    MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes.
    CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens.
    MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.
    CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.
    MEMBER VALENCIA: Yes.
    CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And I am a yes.
    Motion carries.
    (Whereupon, the Board went into

MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, based on the recent evidence and testimony, I would like to make a motion to defer until next month.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: There is a motion to defer by Trustee Murphy. Seconded by Trustee McPhillips.

Trustee Murphy.
MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Holt.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee
Conyears-Ervin.
MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.
MEMBER SONI: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips.
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens.
MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.
MEMBER VALENCIA: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And I am a yes.
It is moved until next month. It is
deferred.
MR. PINELLI: Mr. Marconi and Ms. Mazor, the record is closed as you know. The Board has decided since there is a lot of material here to defer the matter, review everything, and then they would vote at the next board meeting, which would be our May meeting date, the third Wednesday of the month. Okay?

MR. MARCONI: Okay.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Thank you.
MR. MARCONI: Thank you.
MEMBER MURPHY: I'd like to move on to
Item 5, Approval of the Board Physician Reviews for the Disability Recipients. I'd like to approve the Board physician's recommendations for reviews.

Trustee Murphy.
MEMBER MURPHY: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Holt.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee

Conyears-Ervin.

MEMBER CONYEARS-ERVIN: Yes.
CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Soni.

MEMBER SONI: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee McPhillips.

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Tebbens.

MEMBER TEBBENS: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Trustee Valencia.

MEMBER VALENCIA: Yes.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: And I am a yes.
Motion carries.

MEMBER MURPHY: Moving on to Item 6, the Investments. I would like to turn this over to Lorna, who will walk us through the Investment Agenda.

MEMBER SONI: I have to leave, I apologize. I just wanted to let the Board know. Thank you.

MEMBER MURPHY: Very good.

MS. BOECKMAN: Thank You, Trustee Soni.
MS. SCOTT: Given the time, \(I\) am going to keep my investment update somewhat short. There are four items on the Agenda.

The first item is the Investment Report,
that primarily covers performance. Very briefly, year-to-date the Fund is up 3.8 percent. It is ahead of its benchmark by 0.3 percent. It is a really good start to the year.

Brady will be doing his quarterly review
next month so \(I\) will leave the performance discussion until then.

The next item on the Agenda is the Security Lending Report and again that report is there for your review. Generally no concerns. We are diversified across a number of borrowers and we have received the appropriate level of collateral. Again, no issues with securities lending.

The third item is the Investment
Consultant Search. As a reminder, we issued a RFP back in January for an Investment Consultant and that was really due to the expiration of Callan's consulting contract.

We had six firms respond. Those firms were Callan Investment Performance Services, Marquette, Meketa, NEPC and Verus. None of these firms are qualified MWDBE firms.

The goal today is to narrow those six responses to three finalists and those finalists
would present at an Investment Committee meeting in May. That meeting will probably last two to three hours and it will be scheduled before the board meeting.

Looking at the finalists, I have shared my views. I have shared notes on these firms. In summary, \(I\) could work with all of these firms and all of these firms would provide a solid level of investment consulting advice and client services to the Fund.

Based on my observation of how trustees have worked and interacted with the consultant in the past, at this first level of review \(I\) really focused on the consultant's Chicago presence, their experience with Illinois clients, their progress toward MWDBE and their workforce and the level of fees that they are charging.

So the firms that rise to the top, based on this criteria, are Callan, Marquette and Meketa.

So with that, I am looking for a motion to bring these three firms forward, unless there is any questions.

CHAIRMAN FORTUNA: Is there a motion?
MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: I will make that
motion.
MEMBER NANCE-HOLT: Second.

MS. SCOTT: One more item is our cash
needs. Marc, if you want to share your screen and I will turn it over to Jackie to layout our cash position.

MS. VLAHOS: As we can see for our cash
needs as of April 20, 2021, we currently have a balance of \(\$ 164\) million in our Chase account.

Basically, that is due to we have this other source of funding coming that the City has contributed to us in order to makeup the difference of the City tax receipts so they don't have to have the taxes as high.

We received both, two distributions, for the other sources of income from them of \$61 million in the last couple of weeks bringing us to \(\$ 164\) million.

We anticipate one more salary contribution by the end of the month of \$1.8 million bringing us to total cash available of \$166 million.

Our benefits this month are slightly
higher. I'd say about \(\$ 5\) million higher than normal because we are anticipating paying out the Retros. We have \(\$ 36\) million in benefit payments and then with our Refunds or Death Benefits bringing us to a total that we will payout at the end of April of \(\$ 38.2\) million.

After we make our payments, we will be left with a surplus at the end of April of
\$127.8 million in our Chase.
Normally we invest in Fidelity, but right now, with discussions with the City, we're leaving it in a Chase vehicle right now because they are getting 5 basis points versus Fidelity right now is only returning 1 basis point on our money.

If you go to the next page for our cash flows, as you can see, as we already anticipated, due to the higher employer contributions, we should have no drawdowns for the remainder of 2021 or 2022 as long as we get the tax receipts in like we anticipate in that first column where it says "Average Tax Receipts".

As you can see towards the bottom, the average tax receipts, we have a total of \(\$ 139.9\) million remaining to be collected. And I think for the total year we are supposed to receive I think around \(\$ 372\) million. We currently have received 62 percent of what we are due from the City which is a really great number.

If anyone has any questions, \(I\) am trying to keep it short for you.

I think Lorna might discuss a little bit more about taking a little bit of that money that
we have and maybe investing it somewhere else to get a little bit higher of a return.

MS. SCOTT: On the rebalancing template, this first column shows our allocation as of April 19th. At the very bottom of the first column, you can see we have \(\$ 800\) thousand of cash at Northern.

Jackie had said she has a balance of \$127 million after April payments.

So on the template, what \(I\) am proposing doing, if we transfer \(\$ 30\) million over from Chase and we will keep \(\$ 15\) million in the Northern STIFF Fund, which gives us a slight overweight to cash but still within our target. Then we will transfer \$15 million to the Earnest Short Duration Fund. And this transfer would then true-up our fixed income exposure. It keeps our cash liquid. So the cash will be there to make benefit payments towards the end of the year.

If we look at the last column, the variance, this compares our asset allocation versus where we would be after the transfer. You can see within equities, we will be slightly overweight but above target in public equities, but that is offset by an underweight or under target in private equity
so in line around the equities.
Then you can see we are under target in real assets and liquid diversifying but broadly across the asset allocation. After this we are still going to be within our asset allocation ranges.

If there are no questions, \(I\) would be
looking for a motion to investment \(\$ 15\) million with Earnest in their Short Fund.

MEMBER MCPHILLIPS: I will make the motion.

MEMBER MURPHY: Mr. President, moving on to Legislative Updates. Sarah, would you please proceed?

MS. BOECKMAN: Absolutely. Thank you. Good morning, everyone, or rather good afternoon.

For the legislative update, you do have the report from your lobbyist Brandon Phelps included in your board portal.

I did speak with Brandon this morning.

He said nothing is really moving at this point. It is the deadline for the third reading on all bills today. He also indicated that Budget negotiations have started so there seems to be a little bit of a shift to discussing the upcoming Budget.

He said he would continue to update us.

I will let you know if anything starts to move off of that list that was provided in his report but as of right now he doesn't see anything moving.

That is all, unless anyone has any
questions I am happy to report back to Brandon.
MEMBER TEBBENS: I have a question. Do we have an impact statement on the cost of House Bill 2451 ? Do we know what the cost is on that?

MS. BOECKMAN: We did not prepare an impact statement, Trustee Tebbens. We don't normally do that, unless there is a specific request from a legislator or a group and then we obviously review the cost of preparing that report and whether or not it is prudent and whether or not we need to come back to the Board and get approval to do so, but we have not done a cost impact study at this point.

MEMBER TEBBENS: We will ultimately be able to determine that cost based on an annual calculation based on an ARC formula, aren't we?

MS. BOECKMAN: Correct, yes.
MEMBER TEBBENS: When would we have that information, based on the natural occurrence of when that ARC calculation is calculated?
\(\square\)
MS. BOECKMAN: It would be my
understanding that would be something that the actuaries are looking at as part of their report right now. The actuaries are working right now, along with your auditors, to prepare numbers that they need to get over to the City so that the City can determine what its required contribution is for the prior year and then the go-forward year.

I would anticipate that the actuaries are looking at that cost as we speak. I can confirm with them but it would be included as part of their analysis.

MEMBER TEBBENS: Within their normal course of calculating it, would they be able to identify that piece for us so we know specifically what that piece cost is?

TRUSTEE MCPHILLIPS: I think we better ask.

MS. BOECKMAN: I don't think that is something they normally would do, Trustee Tebbens. It is going to be a final number but I can go to them and ask if that is something that they can segregate so the Board is aware of what that is. MEMBER TEBBENS: I would like that
segregated. If we needed a motion to effectuate that, \(I\) would like that, but \(I\) think it's important that we have that segregated.

MS. BOECKMAN: Right now \(I\) don't think there is any motion necessary. If for some reason they indicate that it would be an added cost, which I don't anticipate, but if there is an added cost \(I\) will let you know and if we need to get further Board approval to move forward but I don't anticipate that being the case.

MEMBER TEBBENS: Again, you would anticipate that this normally would be done -- we would have an answer to that question about when?

MS. BOECKMAN: They are working on the report right now so they can get numbers over to the City. They normally do preliminary numbers mid-May. Those numbers then being finalized at the end of May, early June. So I would anticipate it would be consistent with that timeline.

I can ask them if this is something that they can kind of push a little bit earlier but that is the normal timeline for them preparing their report and getting those numbers to the City.

MEMBER TEBBENS: Okay. If it is just
through their normal course, if they could juggle that around as one piece before the other piece, and it doesn't interfere with their normal operation, that would be great. June is what you're saying is what you anticipate?

MS. BOECKMAN: It is but \(I\) will ask them.
MEMBER TEBBENS: Very good. Thank you, I appreciate it.

MS. BOECKMAN: Absolutely.
MEMBER MURPHY: Legal update.
MS. BURNS: There is nothing new. This is a good thing that there are no cases. No cases other than the Underwood case still pending.

Thank you, sir, but nothing new to report.

MEMBER MURPHY: Moving on to Item 10, the Interim Executive Director's Report, Sarah.

MS. BOECKMAN: Thank you. I just have a few things to report today.

The first is in relation to the May meeting. Unfortunately, there are several scheduling conflicts amongst Trustees for the current scheduled May meeting.

I will be contacting you with some dates
to confirm rescheduling that meeting. If you could be on an alert for an email from me in the next week, I would appreciate that.

The second item is with respect to a Callan education opportunity. Lorna sent me some materials. It is included in Boardvantage. It takes place July 19 th through 21st.

You can attend virtually so this is a good opportunity, to the extent it interests Trustees, to meet your eight hours of fiduciary training that you are required to accomplish on an annual basis.

If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to reach out to me or Lorna with respect to them and we can help get you registered.

Next is with respect to the Benefit Analyst position. As you will recall, as part of your Budget that you approved earlier this year, you included a new position for Benefit Analyst.

One of the reasons is Liz, who has been here for 25 plus years and does an amazing job, she will be retiring in the next year.

So Steve thought it was prudent and the Board agreed and I agreed to get someone in to
start training with Liz. Michelle also helps with benefits but it is on a part-time basis. So it's important that you get someone new in who can start getting the institutional knowledge that Liz and Michelle maintain.

So that individual has been identified by the internal search committee. If Trustees have questions about the individual, they can come to me. We are going to keep it confidential right now because he has tentatively accepted.

I can tell you that the salary range is consistent with what you approved in your Budget, but he has not yet formally signed the offer letter that we're going to be presenting to him later today.

If you have questions, please don't hesitate to reach out. My hope is that we can introduce this individual to the Board at the May meeting just very briefly and we're excited to have this individual be part of the team.

The last item before we move to discuss the Executive Director's search is in relation to the Fund's insurance policy and this is your General Business Owner umbrella policy.
\(\square\)
I received a notification this week from your broker that the insurance company that provides you this coverage, which is Travelers, will not be renewing your coverage. So effective the end of June, you need to get a new insurance provider to provide you again General Business Owner and your umbrella insurance company.

The reason that they are not renewing this is because of the claim that was made last year, February of 2020, related to the litigation involving trustees. So because there was a claim made on the policy under that litigation, the carrier has declined to extend coverage after the expiration period.

So the broker is working right now in the marketplace to get other quotes. I will tell you that you currently pay with Travelers on an annual basis \(\$ 2,200\) so \(I\) would expect that to go up a little bit as far as what quotes we will receive, but \(I\) will keep you updated. Again, this is mostly just to update you because \(I\) received notification this week.

So other than that, those four items, that is all \(I\) have to report. I will take any
questions that anyone might have.
If there are none, then \(I\) would recommend we move on to discuss the Executive Director's search, which I believe we will want a motion to go into executive session.

MS. BURNS: That would be a motion to go into closed session pursuant to Section \(2(c) 1\) of the Open Meetings Act.
